New Ash Green residents can now enjoy a new free outdoor gym located on the Sportsfield (adjacent to The Pavilion), Punch Croft, thanks to receiving funding of £11,040. The funding was awarded from the *Big Lottery Fund 'Awards For All'* (£6,040), *Kent County Council* (£3,500) and *Sevenoaks District Council* (£1,500).

A proposal for an outdoor gym had been under consideration for many years, but the cost was considered to be unaffordable from VA funds. Office staff then undertook to identify sources of external funding. An initial application to the Big Lottery Fund was rejected but, after part funding was secured from KCC (Members' Fund) and Sevenoaks District Council, a later application to the Big Lottery Fund was successful. Instrumental in securing lottery funding was the support of the Jubilee Medical Practice and the favourable responses to a consultation of residents.

The equipment

will hopefully encourage people of all ages, abilities and fitness levels to exercise, free of charge whilst getting some fresh air at the same time! It will allow users to have a full workout including toning, cardio or chill-out exercises. Many gyms can be intimidating, not to mention expensive, the outdoor gym is perfect for beginners, experienced athletes or friends to work out together.

The gym features six pieces of fitness equipment including a Double Air Walker, Seated Leg Press, Double Cross Country Skier, Double Rower, Combined Pull Down Challenger/Seated Leg Press, and a Push-up & Dip Station. Refreshments can also be obtained nearby in

the Pavilion during opening hours.

The VA would like to thank the *Big Lottery Fund's 'Awards For All'* scheme, *Kent County Council* and *Sevenoaks District Council*, the *Jubilee Medical Group* and everyone else who supported this bid. The outdoor gym is now up and running, be sure to check it out!!

VA Open Meeting

Council of Management (CoM) called an Open Meeting (7th July) to discuss ways of attracting villagers to stand for election to CoM. Notwithstanding a change in the rules for eligibility for consideration some years ago, such that virtually all owners of property within the village are now able to participate, none had come forward!



About 100 villagers attended what turned out to be a very lively meeting. As Chairman, I set out the reason for calling the meeting and the need to recruit "new blood" to CoM, particularly those younger householders who would be able to shape the future of their village, for the benefit of themselves and their children.

There followed a number of contributions from the floor on both how to get new people interested, what had been done wrong in the past and what people felt should

be done in the future. In particular, there was a strong sense that there should be better communication from CoM to villagers (and that this needed to be two way), that CoM needed to take on a stronger village leadership role, rather than simply focus on the land management of the village, and that action should be taken actively to promote the benefits of the village, with a view to enhancing property values. Many expressed negative views, but there were some who were quite upbeat.

Refreshingly, a number of people expressed an interest in being considered for a role on CoM, whilst an even greater number wished to join a working group proposed from the floor, purpose yet to be crystallised, but essentially considering how villagers wanted to see their village moving forward.

I concluded by inviting those who had expressed an interest in joining CoM to a crash course teach-in on the duties and powers of the VA, which took place on 18th July. At the scheduled CoM meeting on 20th July, a number of people were co opted onto CoM.

Given the enthusiasm generated, I felt that now was the right time for me to stand down as Chairman of the VA, so I have now left CoM and wish the new management a hugely successful future. I add to this my heartfelt thanks to all those villagers who have served with me on CoM since I started in 1984, without whose support and critical views the village would not be what it is today. I also extend my thanks to our paid staff, past and present, who have served the village well, both in the office and the greenland workforce.

Thinking of Building?

Are you thinking of having building work done?

Due to the covenants in the Village you will know that to change the external appearance of your property in any way at all (extension, conservatory, doors, windows etc) you need to obtain approval in writing from the Village Association before starting work.

The Amenity Committee that considers such applications meets throughout the year at around 6 weekly intervals. However on the first Saturday of each month members

of the committee are at the VA offices from 10.30am until noon to give anyone informal guidance on their proposed works. It always pays to talk first before finalising your designs!

Although these sessions cannot grant approval they can steer you away from solutions that are unlikely to be accepted and towards those that are. So why not come along and talk to us!

Focus on Crime

Sevenoaks District is one of the most crime free areas in Kent. Of course that does not mean there is no crime and, realistically, some crimes will always occur as new villains come along to take over from those who have been caught. But it is little consolation to anyone who has been the victim of a crime to know it is a rare occurrence – indeed it is perhaps worse to know you have been singled out for unwanted attention.

The New Ash Green Focus Group meets regularly, involving the Parish Council, Village Association, Community Warden, Police, Neighbourhood Watch, the Sevenoaks District Council’s Community Safety Unit and other local organisations. This highlights the work that is being done to prevent crime and to deal with those that have been committed, ensuring all the relevant people know who has to respond to the issues and where problems are

likely to occur. The Community Safety Unit has the same role across Sevenoaks District, making sure that resources are targeted to where the need is greatest on a daily basis.

It is worth looking at the overall figures and comparing them with the number of people and properties in this area. In New Ash Green there are some 2,340 houses and about 50 commercial and community premises. Around 6,000 people live in the village. In the past year, crimes of all types have averaged just 25 to 30 per month – less than one a day. The chance of being a victim is very small and a significant number of the reported crimes, particularly violent or sexual offences, are not random attacks but occur in the home – by people known to the victim.

The chart with the comparison of crime types helps us to see what the main issues

are. Perhaps it is not surprising to see that burglary, anti-social behaviour and vehicle crimes are most prevalent but the graphs show that where spikes occur, the Police have responded with extra resources and they have been able to target the offenders to prevent the problem escalating.

The key to all this is information. Any crimes must always be reported as soon as possible to the Police, phoning 999 if a crime is in progress or 101 at other times, and to your neighbourhood watch co-ordinator. Make sure you get a crime reference number from the Police. The response of the Police will be determined by the number of reports they receive. New Ash Green Town Team – 3 years on



Originally set up in 2012 to bid for Government money in the Portas Pilot regeneration scheme, the Town Team consists of parish, district and county councillors with representatives of New Ash Green Village Association, local businesses and residents. Sevenoaks District Council provides assistance from its economic development team.

Although unsuccessful in the main Portas Pilot competition, a consolation award of £10,000 was received and the Town Team has since been making use of that money to promote the use of the shopping centre and carry out some enhancements to make it more attractive for people to use.

Built in 1969 and extended in 1983, New Ash Green's shopping centre once had over 50 shops on two levels, but a gradual change in trading patterns coupled with the failure by the landowners to keep up with maintenance of the buildings led to many of them closing. Some have been converted to other purposes, most notably the upper level which now boasts a thriving gym, but many others lie empty and look derelict.

Residents are all too aware that the shopping centre as a whole

is now in a sad state of disrepair, hence the continuing efforts of the Town Team to find ways to rejuvenate and invigorate this focal point of our village.

Cameron Clark, the Chairman of the Town Team, says, "A thriving shopping centre is vital for everyone who lives or works in New Ash Green. The neglect by its owners has led to a sad decline which must now be reversed. Support from the people of the village is essential if we are to make the improvements we want. We must all work together to do as much as we can while supporting the Council's attempts to engage with the landowners to develop permanent, long-term regeneration of the centre. Victoria Barnard's recent petition to the Council is one such example of the strength of feeling and desire for action."

Here are some examples of the Town Team's activities so far:

- The 2014 'Christmas Magic' and ice skating event;
- Provision of new Christmas lights
- Replacement of roadside signs;
- New planting within the centre and proposals for more;
- Anti-dog fouling measures;
- Pigeon deterrents;

While some may see these small initiatives as simply papering over the cracks, the Town Team members are committed to carrying out those things which are achievable and make a noticeable difference now. Much as we'd love to refurbish the centre from top to bottom, this is simply not within our power, so our aim is to continue to enhance and promote the shopping area as a focal and essential part of New Ash Green, in the hope that more may be possible as time goes by.

The buildings may be sadly neglected, but it's the people who bring life to a village, so please support your shopping centre in any and every way possible.

Village Centre Petition

In April this year Victoria Barnard, a resident of NAG since 2007, started a petition for the regeneration of our Village Centre. The petition attracted over 1600 signatures and was put before Sevenoaks District Council on 21st July.

Victoria was given five minutes to put her points of concern across and in making her presentation Victoria described how over the last eight years the village centre has declined year on year.

Victoria described how she had spoken to 2 out of 3 of the landowners on numerous occasions since 2007. Each time, Richmond Lodge (managing agent for the principal landowner, Piperton Finance) and the Co-operative each blame the other and advise that they are aware of some issues and are trying to resolve them. This has been the answer to questions on the regeneration of the centre since proposals were made public in 2007; eight

years later still no response.

With the majority of the units empty and in such a bad state of disrepair with excessive water damage and other issues that they are clearly not using the centre as it was originally intended. The landowners need to invest a substantial amount of money to bring it back to a reasonable standard so the units can be rented out and the centre improved overall. Which they themselves have admitted they are not prepared to do.

Victoria asked for the Councils to pull together: -

- Environmental Health - to deal with the major issues highlighted in the petition;
- Planning - to enforce work to deal with the current dereliction and to work with the landowners for long-term regeneration;
- Housing - to achieve a vibrant community in any regeneration proposals;

- Community Safety - to make the centre a safer and more attractive place to visit and help to plan for regeneration;
- Business support - to encourage more businesses to start up and improve the viability of the centre;
- Economic Development - to develop a regeneration plan that will give New Ash Green a modern, attractive centre that will serve the needs of the people from the village and further a field, as it was originally intended.

Victoria received applause from the gallery on her concise and eloquent presentation.

Councillors were then given 15 minutes to debate all the concerns raised, it was unanimously agreed that Councillor Peter Fleming would now take the matter to the Cabinet and will report back within six months.

Did you know.....

Bus Service Cuts -

Arriva will be making significant cuts to the buses in New Ash Green from 9th August 2015. Both the 433 service to Darent Valley Hospital and Bluewater and the 489 service to Gravesend will be reduced to one bus every two hours. This has been done without any consultation with local councils or other representatives of residents.

Cameron Clark has made efforts to get Arriva to say more but at the time of print no update had been received. The management of Darent Valley Hospital is also very concerned and will be contacting Arriva.

Ultimately, of course, the only way to stop Arriva reducing the bus service even more is to use them!

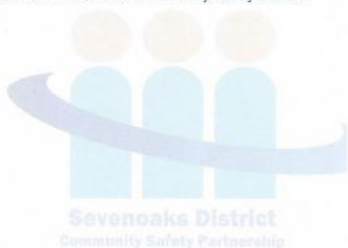
